Excerpt From the Minutes of June 2008

The Scouting Movement in Canada

(Ref. 2008-04, "The Scouting Movement in Canada"; 2008-04-A, Copy of Submission Report 2007-81, "8th World Scout Jamboree")

1. Background

Dr. Alway reminded the Full Board that at its meeting in Ottawa in December 2007, it reviewed a submission report on the 8th World Scout Jamboree and determined that the Scouting movement, rather than the Jamboree, would be a more appropriate subject for commemoration under the Board's criteria for national historic significance. The Board therefore asked Parks Canada to bring forward a revised summary of significance that addresses the national historic significance of the Scouting movement in Canada. The submission report now before the Board addresses this question.

2. Recommendations

a. <u>Designation</u>

The Full Board recommended:

the Scouting Movement in Canada for designation as a National Historic Event.

b. Plaque

The Full Board recommended:

that the Scouting Movement in Canada be marked by means of a standard plaque at the site of the 8th World Scout Jamboree at Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario.

c. Name

The Full Board recommended the name as:

EN The Scouting Movement in Canada

FR (le) scoutisme au Canada

d. <u>Commemorative Intent</u>

The Full Board recommended The Scouting Movement in Canada for designation because:

- since 1908, the Boy Scout movement has been among the largest and most influential youth movements in Canada, its membership reaching more than 280,000 scouts in 1965;
- it became one of the most successful youth education movements by promoting, through games and outdoor activities, character-building, good citizenship and self-reliance, the quintessential expressions of the ideals and methods for scouting; and,
- by holding the first world jamboree outside of Europe, at Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario, in 1955, the movement contributed to a favourable image of Canada in the minds of thousands of Scouts from around the world who assembled there.
